Class News

Van Gogh Class News

We have had a busy week preparing for Mothers Celebrations. The children have words hard and I hope that you will get a chance to put your feet up and enjoy their way of saying 'thank you'.

Phonics

Week 5 – 6	Consolidating and applying all sounds and tricky words learnt to date.

Reading

We continue to focus on Non – Fiction books, we will be comparing them to Fiction books and looking at the key features for example, contents page, index page etc.

Please take note of the children's personal targets in their reading records and continue to share fiction and nonfiction books.

Writing

We will be introducing poems and will write our own poem about spring.

It is important the children are confidently applying their digraphs when writing words/sentences. Please continue to encourage the children to write at home, reminding them to use their whooshes in and out to form cursive letters, use finger spaces, a capital letter at the start of their sentence and a full stop at the end. Remember writing does not always mean sitting at a desk, they can write lists, recipes, make tickets, label things etc, it's all about then having a go.

<u>Maths</u>

We will continue to recognise/order numbers, understand and apply them in different contexts and to solve problems.

This week we are introducing number 17 and 18. We will look at how the TEN block holds it place for example 17 is one TEN and seven more... 18 is one TEN and eight more. We will continue to revise number bonds of five and ten.

The children will continue to look for 3D shapes in the environment, for example a sphere has one curved face, it is round and can be rolled on the floor. A globe, ball, marble are all spheres. Other shapes we will be learning about over the next few weeks are cylinder, cube, cuboid, and cone.

We will be re-visiting doubling and halving and consolidating how it is the opposite for example, double four is eight. Half of eight if four. We will also look at how halving means to share between two.

Our snack shop continues to be a success with the children paying for their snack using 1p, 2p, 5p and 10p coins and starting to compare different values by identifying things that are worth more/less.

The children have also been learning to tell the time using an analogue clock, over the last few weeks we have look at the key features of a clock, clock face, hour hand and minute hand. They have learnt how to tell o'clock and over the next few weeks we will be introducing half past.

Topic

This week we will re-visit and compare the changes in the environment over the last three seasons. We will continue to look at the importance of 'new life' as we approach Easter and will start by learning about the life cycle of a chick.

It is important that the children are independent and start to walk to the classroom on their own as this is what they will be doing in September when they are in Monet.

Monet

We have had another busy week in Monet Class. We have finished our fantastic non-fiction chalk stream books, enjoyed numbering the pages and compiling them. We have also displayed our whole class paintings of a trout life cycle in the hall. Lots of the children have also completed their weaving, taken it off the loom and displayed it. They look beautiful!



Next Wednesday we are very excited to be going on a walk to the River Chess to release our trout. Please bring a pair of wellies to wear for the walk there and back.

In English for the next two weeks, we will be exploring poetry looking at adjectives, suffixes (ful and less) and compound words. We will have lots of fun reading, reciting and performing spring and Easter poems and writing some of our own.

In Maths, Year 1 will be using their knowledge of number bonds to bridge 10 using bead strings and ten frames and Year 2 will be quickly adding multiple single digit numbers by using number facts (doubles, bonds to 10, bridging 10). We will also be solving word problems using addition and subtraction.

As part of our science topic, we will be enjoying our trip to the River Chess to release the trout and we will also be thinking about how animals get their food and begin to make a food chain mobile.

In RE we will be thinking about The Easter Story and making Easter cards and Easter craft. In computing over the next few weeks, we will be spending time experimenting with 'scratch' to understand the need for exact instructions and to grow and shrink characters.

Homework will be on Google classroom.

Hockney

Well what a busy week we have had this week in Hockney class!

It's been a little bit of a topsy-turvy week with so much going on. The Year 4s were very excited to start their cricket lessons on Monday and they all came bursting into the classroom on Friday to take part in their Bikeability training.

As we fast approach the end of term there is still much to look forward to. Next week in English, we are starting a new unit focusing on exploring poetic form and how form in different poems can add to the meaning. We shall be studying the work of Grace Nichols and James Carter comparing their poems and the different poetic devices that they use.

In maths next week we shall continue our work on adding and subtracting fractions. The Year 3s are focusing on tenths and decimal numbers and the Year 4s are focusing on finding amounts in non-unit fractions.

In science we are continuing with our study of plants. Our class experiment into different growing conditions of cress is going well and the children have been really interested to see and discuss how and why it is all growing at different rates. With the exception of the cress in the fridge - that is really not doing so well. Please ask your child about our experiment and ask them to explain to you why our cress in the fridge is doing absolutely nothing whereas all the other cress, even the one in the cupboard, is doing something. Likewise, the children's sunflowers are starting to germinate. If you haven't already found a place where you may be able to plant these sunflowers please do so-they will be coming home shortly.

In music this week we have been continuing with our study of gospel music, investigating how it has developed over time and absorbed elements of other music genres such as dance and R & B. The children have learnt to sing Bill Withers 'Lean on Me' and next week we are hoping to perform an instrumental accompaniment alongside our singing. They were also briefly introduced to Elvis Presley and his rendition of 'Amazing Grace' this week. I did ask the children to go home and discuss with an adult some of their favourite Elvis Presley songs-the children all seemed a little confused at some of his dance moves and the audience screaming when I showed them a clip of him performing! Please help to shed some light on this phenomena if you can!

Next week is a largely normal week. Please do ensure that your child has their PE kit in school every day as a few were caught out on Monday by not having their kit ready for Monday's cricket. Forest school will be on Monday afternoon for the Year 3s and this will be their penultimate session.

Homework is as ever on Google Classrooms with English due next Wednesday and maths due on Thursday.

We hope you have an enjoyable weekend in the sunshine (we hope) and that your child is getting plenty of rest so that we can really make the most of the time we have before breaking up for Easter.

Hepworth

Another week has whizzed by, and Hepworth have had a very active week. On top of PE, the Daily Mile, cricket sessions, swimming, sports clubs and matches, Hepworth also took part in a Dodgeball tournament at The Amersham School. (It's exhausting just writing it!) Everyone really enjoyed the afternoon, and they were all enthusiastic participants, playing with skill and respect for the rules. Well done Hepworth, you were great advocates for the school.

Next week the children will continue to write their migrating animal reports in English, and their SPAG focus will be on layout devices, for example: headings, sub-headings, columns, bullets, or tables, to structure their writing. Their spelling rule will be using the suffix -ible.

In Maths, pupils will be revisiting time - building on their previous knowledge. They will also be covering position and direction where they will draw, translate and reflect polygons on a co-ordinate grid, as well as find missing co-ordinates.

In Topic, Hepworth will experience Mayan culture by listening to their music, as well as playing Ocarinas. In Spanish, the children continue to learn about seasons and the weather. They will listen to a Spanish song about the Spring and try translating the lyrics with the aid of a bilingual dictionary. In Science the children will continue their learning about inheritance and evolution by looking at specific ways in which animals are adapted to their environment. In RE we will be applying our learning across the term about religious leaders to consider what makes a good leader. In PSHE we will be continuing our learning about the world of work and the journey towards this.

An important reminder – our Sex Education and PGL information evening is on Thursday 31st March at 5pm in the hall and it is an important one to come along to.

We will begin with the sex education information so you will be able to leave after this if your child isn't attending PGL this year. Of course, you are welcome to stay if you are considering your child taking part in 2023 and would like more information.

Please note, this evening session is for parents/carers only – please make arrangements so your child does not attend with you.

Finally, please remember that the children will not be swimming on Wednesdays anymore, so they will need their normal PE kits in school. Instead, the focus will be on whole body fitness and wellbeing, following the principles of Yoga and Pilates.
